SUBJECT: SB 619 (PADILLA): STATE ENERGY RESOURCES CONSERVATION AND DEVELOPMENT

COMMISSION: CERTIFICATION OF FACILITIES: ELECTRICAL TRANSMISSION PROJECTS

SUPPORT - AS AMENDED JUNE 21, 2023 SCHEDULED FOR HEARING – JULY 10, 2023

The California Chamber of Commerce and the organizations listed strongly **SUPPORT SB 619 (Padilla)**, which builds upon the state's permit streamlining efforts for electrical transmission facility projects delivering clean energy to ensure we are better equipped to meet future energy demand.

According to the California Independent System Operator (CAISO), the state will need to make a sevenfold increase in annual resource requirements that were called for as part of the 2021-22 Transmission Plan¹. This can be attributed to the fact that decarbonization of California's grid is going to require a much higher degree of electrification. Added electrification is going to require more streamlined processes for large scale electrical infrastructure projects, such as those proposed in **SB 619** that are capable of ensuring grid reliability while legacy gas fired generation is retired.

SB 619 Builds on Previous Efforts to Accelerate Grid Electrification

SB 619 provides for an opt-in pathway for environmental review at the California Energy Commission (CEC) of electrical infrastructure projects that are above 138 kv. By passing AB 205 the Legislature has deemed it appropriate for the CEC to serve as the lead on environmental review for certain clean energy projects and to make a determination within a specified timeframe; 270 days. **SB 619** simply extends that authority to transmission and sub-transmission, which are going to be a necessity for all of the anticipated additional resource requirements and serve as an equally important part of the equation for electrification. **SB 619** ensures that load serving entities have the appropriate tools in place to meet our future energy needs. Moreover, it will foster economic growth, create job opportunities, and position California as a leader in clean energy innovation.

SB 619 Appropriately Balances Environmental Protections with Future Energy Demand

SB 619 does not diminish any environmental protections, nor does it interfere with the authorities granted to the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC). To be clear, SB 619 simply allows for an entity to elect to participate in an environmental review process at the CEC that provides more certainty on timelines, and safeguards environmental protections by prohibiting the CPUC from issuing a decision until after the CEC has issued a decision on the certification of a facility. Larger transmission projects will still be required to take the necessary steps to obtain a Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity, or any other required permits from the CPUC before construction can begin. SB 619 will ensure a reliable supply of electricity for a growing economy and our residents and businesses by striking the appropriate balance between environmental protection and allowing load serving entities to save on project costs and delays which ultimately benefits ratepayers. SB 619 is a pragmatic and modest approach to address the state's ever-growing demand for clean energy in California.

For these reasons, we strongly support **SB 619** and respectfully ask for your "AYE" vote.
